

Youth of the Year Award

High School Counselor/Student Packet



General Program Information

The National Exchange Club Youth of the Year program is a Club, District, and National Competition. Students who win at the club level go on to compete in the district and possibly at the national competition. (national award is a \$15,000 scholarship).

This prestigious youth award aims to celebrate and support outstanding students who have demonstrated exceptional leadership, academic achievement, and community involvement. The Youth of the Year honorees are proven to be well-rounded individuals who are not only good students but also involved. Aside from earning points for non-weighted GPA, points are given for participation in school and community organizations.

Club

Clubs select candidates from area high schools in the community. Each winner receives an award determined and approved by the Exchange Club. Youth of the Year winner(s) for a club can be advance by the club to the district competition for consideration.

District

Districts select candidates from club winners' applications that have been advance before the district deadline. Each winner receives an award determined and approved by the District Exchange Clubs. Youth of the Year winner(s) for a district can be advance by the district to the national competition for consideration.

The National Exchange Club

Each District can advance up to two district winners that earn a district award to be eligible for the national competition. The National Youth of the Year winner receive a \$15,000 scholarship at The National Exchange Club Convention in mid-July. The winner must be able to attend the National Convention. The National Exchange Club will make all the travel arrangements.



Instructions to Counselors

As you prepare to nominate students for the prestigious Youth of the Year Award, we are providing you with some helpful tips and best practices to ensure a successful nomination process. Your role is crucial in identifying and supporting outstanding students who exemplify the qualities of leadership, academic excellence, and community involvement.

1. Identify Eligible Students Early

- a. Number of Nominations: The Exchange Club in your area will determine with you the correct number of nominations for your school.
- b. Eligibility Criteria: Grade Level: Students must be in their senior year of high school.
- c. Leadership: Demonstrated leadership in school or community activities.
- d. Community Service: Significant involvement in community service or extracurricular activities.
- e. Early Identification: Begin identifying potential students early in the academic year. Look for students who consistently demonstrate leadership and community engagement.

2. Applications

- a. Please ensure that all required documents, including transcripts and personal essays, are included in the application packet. Certification of these documents is not necessary.
- b. Sign-off on school activities and non-weighted GPA in the application.
- c. Create a separate PDF for each student.

3. Ensure Timely Submission

- a. Deadlines: Keep track of all important deadlines for the nomination and application process. Set internal deadlines to ensure all materials are reviewed and submitted on time.
- b. Follow-Up: Follow up with students to ensure that all parts of the application are complete and submitted by the due date.

Instructions for the Student

- 1. Familiarize yourself with the Youth of the Year application and process.
- 2. Use black ink or black printer cartridge only. Be sure your application is neat, clear, and dark as several copies are made from your original.
- 3. DO NOT ATTACH ADDITIONAL INFORMATION THAT HAS NOT BEEN REQUESTED SUCH AS RESUMES, LETTERS OF COMMENDATION, OR WORK EXPERIENCE.
- 4. Read and follow instructions included in this package. These instructions are to assist you in completing all parts and must be delivered back to your counselor.
- 5. The counselor needs to get all Sections back to the club by the due date on page 4.
- 6. Please note that points in Sections 1A and 1B are given only for the highest level of achievement per semester. For example, the Captain or Co-Captain of an athletic team receives 2 points per semester.
 - You do NOT receive an additional point for being a team member.
- 7. Address your achievements during the five of your final six semesters in high school; this information is normally obtained from school records.
- 8. Your name is to appear ONLY on the Certification & Information Section. No indication of school name or student locality is to be used in your listing of awards or your essay. For example, if receiving an award from Long Beach City, indicate it only as "City" or if from Wilson High School, use "School" or Orange County, use "County." There should be little information gleaned from the activities list or from the essay as to your identity or location.
- 9. You are being asked to write an essay and list your top 10 achievements/awards along with a paragraph describing your most outstanding achievement, please keep the following in mind: Although grammatical correctness and proper use of accepted rules of composition will be considered, points will be awarded primarily on the basis of the overall impact of the essay on the judges. Therefore, logical and clear development as well as the persuasiveness of the argument presented, are most important. The purpose of the essay is to provide the judges with a deeper insight into the character and beliefs of the finalist as well as the finalist's ability to clearly communicate with the reader.
- 10. Save this completed PDF as a New file and forward back to your counselor.

"Orchestra" denotes a formal, symphonic musical organization which is school sponsored, but not included in band activities. "Drum Major/Majorette" must be part of school-sponsored activity.

However, only one such victory may be counted per semester. "Team" denotes any group representing either a high school class or the high school. If the student receives a score as a winner and is part of a team, he/she should also receive credit for team membership.

Section 4: Essay

Each student (nominee) will be responsible for preparing an essay on a subject selected by The National Exchange Club. The essay must be 800–1,200 words maximum). Although grammatical correctness and proper use of accepted rules of composition will be considered, points will be awarded primarily based on the overall impact of the essay. Therefore, logical and clear development, as well as persuasiveness, are most important. The purpose of the essay is to provide the judges with deeper insight into the character and beliefs of the nominee, and the nominee's ability to clearly communicate with the reader. Based on these impressions, judges may award the essay up to 300 points.

Youth of the Year Essay Prompt

"In a world that is constantly changing and ever evolving, our youth play critical roles in shaping the future of their communities. From advocating to leading, young people are taking charge and making significant impact. How have you personally contributed to society and how do you envision your future in community service?"
